## **Summary School Self-Evaluation Report**

#### 1. Introduction

Our school has its own context. There are 6 teachers and 105 pupils in the school. We have a number of programmes operating in the school including PE, Librarian services and afterschool programmes which include swimming, art, football, basketball, chess, guitar and after school care. Our attendance levels are good. Our pupils' behaviour is satisfactory. #### 1.1 The focus of the evaluation

We undertook a school self-evaluation of teaching and learning during the year. We evaluated Literacy. We chose this because we felt that our pupils could improve their learning outcomes in this area.

We collected information from parents, pupils and teachers in preparing this report. We looked at how well our pupils were doing in Literacy.
